MAJOR REGULATIONS

- PREREQUISITES..... Check the *General Catalog* for the prerequisites to all listed courses.
- P/NP GRADING OPTION..... Not allowed for any major course (Prep or UD major), including courses applied to the major from other departments.
- SUBSTITUTIONS..... in the major requirements permissible only by petition to the department chair and dean.
- RESIDENCE REQUIREMENTS..... At least 20 UD units in major while in residence at UCSB.
- G.P.A. REQUIREMENTS..... At least 2.0 overall average in all upper-division major courses and all courses (Prep and UD) for the major, including courses in excess of minimum requirements.
- DOUBLE MAJORS..... With the approval of each department chairperson, up to a total of 8 units may be applied simultaneously to both UD majors.

***Foreign language note:** The full foreign language requirement is:

- quarter 6 (or the equivalent, via placement test or credit from another approved institution) of one language...
- **PLUS** one additional year of your choice of **EITHER**
 - 12 units of advanced and/or upper division courses taught in the same language (same language as the "quarter 6 or equivalent" language)
 - one additional beginning year (or, the quarter 3 equivalent) of a different language (in some cases, 3+ years of high school language credit can be used for this by petition)

Note: This is intended as a **suggested** plan of study only - each individual student's circumstances will by necessity customize this plan. While many students do finish Global Studies major requirements quickly enough to graduate early, the major is **impacted** and therefore **cannot guarantee** an early graduation for any student (just an on-time graduation, within 4 years). The department also cannot guarantee access to every course in every quarter - it is each student's responsibility to make sure they are reading all posted and emailed advising information in order to graduate on schedule.
