*Pre-Global Studies to full Global Studies notes: upon completing the pre-major requirements successfully (see major sheet for details), the student will file a petition with the undergraduate advisor to shift the major from Pre-Global Studies to full Global Studies status

*Foreign language notes: The full foreign language requirement is:

- quarter 6 (or the equivalent, via placement test or credit from another approved institution) of one language...
- PLUS one additional year of your choice of EITHER
 - 12 units of advanced and/or upper division courses taught in the same language (same language as the "quarter 6 or equivalent" language)
 - one additional beginning year (or, the quarter 3 equivalent) of a different language (in some cases, 3+ years of high school language credit can be used for this by petition)

Note: This is intended as a **suggested** plan of study only - each individual student's circumstances will by necessity customize this plan. While many students do finish Global Studies major requirements quickly enough to graduate early, the major is **impacted** and therefore <u>cannot guarantee</u> an early graduation for any student (just an on-time graduation, within 4 years). The department also cannot guarantee access to every course in every quarterit is each student's responsibility to make sure they are reading all posted and emailed advising information in order to graduate on schedule.
